EPA'S SUPERFUND & COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT





- Former steel facility
 - Operated 1950 1995
 - 273 acres
- Northern Portion
 - 76 acres
 - Owned by Rivervew-Trenton Railroad Company
 - EGLE overseeing investigation and cleanup
- Southern Portion
 - 197 acres
 - 14 acres owned by Detroit Steel
 Co
 - 183 acres owned by MSC Land Company, LLC
 - Owner manages environmental requirements and conduct work specified in 2018 agreement
 - EPA's Superfund program will investigate and cleanup up the remainder of property

Superfund **Process Steps**

- Gather historical site condition information to determine if further investigation is needed
- Use Hazard Ranking System to evaluate risks

Community Involvement **Opportunities**

Preliminary Assessment/Site Inspection

 Provide any information you have about the site to the U.S. EPA

- Publish notice in Federal Register and local media announcing proposed listing and public comment period
- Once listed, U.S. EPA publishes notice in Federal Register and responds to comments
- Determines the nature and extent of contamination, evaluates human health and ecological risk

 Presents the cleanup alternatives and is issued for a 30-day public comment period

National **Priorities List Process**

Remedial Investigation/ **Feasibility Study**

- Read information about U.S. EPA's proposal to list the site
- Contact U.S. EPA for questions or additional information
- If concerned, submit comments during the Public Comment period
- Consider forming a Community Advisory Group and applying for a Technical Assistance Grant
- Participate in public meetings
- Contact community involvement coordinator with questions



Community Involvement





The goal of Superfund community involvement is to advocate and strengthen early and meaningful community participation during Superfund cleanups.

Community Involvement Coordinators (CICs)



- assigned to specific projects to assist communities in their interaction with EPA
- ensure technical staff is aware of issues that concern the public in relation to the work EPA is doing
- as liaisons between technical project managers and the community, CICs provide opportunities for two-way communication throughout the life of a project.







WHAT IS A SUPERFUND COMMUNITY ADVISORY GROUP (CAG)?

Basic CAG Facts





- generally 15 to 25 stakeholders
- provide affected and interested parties in the community a voice and opportunity to participate in the Superfund process
- meet regularly over the course of the cleanup project, most CAGs meet monthly or bi-monthly.
- CAGs are independent community organizations, they are not formal "EPA" groups.
- EPA may provide administrative and facilitation support to help convene and manage the CAG
- CAGs do not replace the other EPA public information and outreach activities.

Important Aspects of CAGs



MEMBERSHIP MUST BE BALANCED.

reflect all the interests and viewpoints in a community.

ALL MEETINGS ARE PUBLIC. CAGs are transparent and all meetings are open to the public.

CAG MEMBERS
WORK AT IT. CAG
members can spend 4
to 8 hours a month
learning about the site,
attending meetings,
and working on
crafting input.





Why a CAG?



IMPROVED ACCESS: People affected by Superfund sites have a right to know what the Agency is doing in their community and to have a say in the decision-making process.

STRONGER VOICE: An effective CAG is a very powerful way to give voice to the entire community.

DEEPER UNDERSTANDING:

CAGs bring people together and promote understanding of a range of perspectives.

BETTER INPUT: CAGs provide EPA in-depth community understanding and input and

common GROUND: CAGs help identify where the community holds common concerns and builds consensus community recommendations.

CAGs



...are designed as a mechanism for all affected and interested parties in a community to have a voice and actively participate in the Superfund process

...are informal and do not have any decisionmaking authority, and they do not receive any resources or special attention above and beyond what is normally provided to a community

What does a CAG do?





Hold regular, typically monthly, meetings.



Review technical information about site cleanup and other environmental problems.



Meet with EPA and state to learn about the site and related issues.



Work with EPA and state to solve problems.



Provide recommendations and advice about the cleanup and ensure that public input reflects the full range of community interests and concerns.



Create a strong connection to the community. Help to communicate issues to the broader community.

Methods for establishing CAGs



Screening Panels Model

Organize shortterm panel

Panel ID's list of recommended nominees

Existing Group Model

Existing Group selected as CAG

EPA can suggest group expand membership if not representative

Self-Selecting Model

Local community IDs CAG members

Core Group Model

EPA consults with state/tribal/local governments to select Core group

Core group could include self-nomination

Members of core group selects remaining members of CAG in open process


Balance of Interests




