# NMCC Class of 2025 looks forward to college, tech schools, careers

NEW MADRID, Mo. - New Madrid County Central High School senior Jaleecia Walton may have summed up Decision Day best: "Follow your dream and don't be afraid to pursue

Walton and 70 other NMCC seniors were recognized for taking the next steps toward their careers during the 2025 Decision Day on May 7. NMCC is one of more than 150 Missouri high schools participating in Decision Day this

Dallas Allen, junior-senior high school counselor at Central High School, said she begins working with students at the start of their senior year to help them prepare for life after graduation, whether that means college, trade school, the military or entering the workforce. The May ceremony recognizes that preparation and intention.

"In high school they have prepared for this for four years. I think Decision Day is important because now they can make a commitment to continue on with their future plans,' Allen said.

According to Allen the program, now in its third year at NMCC, makes a difference.

What I have noticed from last year and the year before is that if our students who have gone off to colleges or to the military after they sign, they usually stay there," she said.

Slade Courtois wants to become an electrical distribution systems lineman. Working with Allen, he was accepted into State Technical College of Missouri and signed his Decision Day paperwork surrounded by his family.

"Mrs. Allen has been a really big help to me. She made sure my paperwork, test scores everything was right," he said. "My family has been a really

big help, too. Since her freshman year in high school, Walton knew she wanted to follow the path taken by two of her siblings into the military. She said she chose the Air Force because of the edu-

cational support it offers. In addition to her military service, Walton plans to study either business or nursing.

Along with Walton's family, U.S. Air Force Technical Sgt. Cynthia True was on hand to show her support for Walton and show what the military's commitment to her future would be with a ceremonial check for \$234,762. She explained the amount is the average cost of tuition in the United States plus the E-4 pay a participant would receive for the four years of college.

While Walton's ment to service will depend on the job path she chooses, True described it an excellent oppor-

Administrative Record Available PCE North West Street Superfund Site Sikeston, Scott County, Missouri May 2025

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region 7 has compiled the Administrative Record (AR) for the PCE North West Street Superfund Site in Sikeston, Scott County, Missouri. The AR is the official site file that contains technical documents with respect to response actions at the site. EPA developed this document collection to form a clear understanding of the site.

The site includes a former dry-cleaning facility and a tetrachloroethylene (PCE) groundwater plume that has impacted two of the city's public drinking water wells. EPA will oversee the Potentially Responsible Party removal action to mitigate impacts to the drinking water and to evaluate potential vapor intrusion into nearby structures.
