For a ride on a slightly larger vehicle, try a tour of the city on one of Boston's many trolley tours or Boston's Duck Tours, which give you a tour of the city by street before plunging into the Charles River to see the city by water. Boston is known as America's Walking City, and several of the city's—and the country's—most historic Revolutionary War sites can be found along Boston's **Freedom Trail**, a 2.5-mile, brick-lined route that leads you to 16 historically significant sites.
