

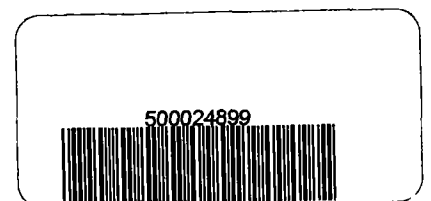

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SECTION 1.0 OVERVIEW OF THE COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT PLAN

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) developed this Community Involvement Plan to facilitate two-way communication between the community surrounding the R & H Oil/Tropicana Energy Site and EPA and to encourage community involvement in site activities. EPA will utilize the community involvement activities outlined in this plan to ensure that residents are continuously informed and provided opportunities to be involved.

This Community Involvement Plan addresses the R&H Oil/Tropicana Energy Site's relationship to the community and EPA (Section 2.0), provides a background of the community (Section 3.0), presents EPA's community involvement program (Section 4.0), and provides a listing of resources available (Appendices). EPA drew upon several information sources to develop this plan, including community interviews and site files. The EPA's Regional Office will oversee the implementation of the community involvement activities outlined in this Plan.

SECTION 2.0 CAPSULE SITE DESCRIPTION

2.1 Site History

The site was used for various petroleum-refining operations since approximately 1934. The northern tract previously housed oil refineries and most recently a waste oil recycling facility. The southern tract previously housed oil refineries, a petroleum distribution facility, and most recently fuel/gasoline blending operations. The waste oil recycling activities on the northern tract and the fuel/gasoline blending operations on the southern tract ceased in approximately the late 1980's or early 1990's. The site is presently inactive.

2.2 Site Description/Location

The site area totals approximately six to seven acres and is composed of two tracts: a northern tract located at 403 Somerset Road, San Antonio TX, 78211 and a southern tract located at 507 (formerly 419 in proposed listing documentation) Somerset Road in San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas. The site is located approximately five miles southwest of downtown San Antonio. The site is bordered by an auto service center to the north, the Union Pacific Railroad line, an auto repair and parts establishment, and Kelly Air Force Base to the west, residential, commercial, and industrial development to the south and east and Somerset Road to the east.

Petroleum hydrocarbon compounds have been found in some site soil and groundwater samples at concentrations exceeding the health-based screening levels established by the EPA and/or the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). These compounds are primarily lighter hydrocarbons (benzene, toluene, ethylbenzene, and xylenes [BTEX]). Non-aqueous phase liquids (NAPLs), or free-phase hydrocarbons, are also present in some areas at the site. The NAPL and impacted soils are typically 10-15 feet below ground surface, where vertical migration from any releases was stopped by the water table. The extent of NAPL and soil impacts at the site are limited to the on-site property.

Shallow groundwater at the site is impacted by petroleum hydrocarbons. These petroleum hydrocarbons were not detected in off-site groundwater monitoring wells at concentrations exceeding the health-based screening levels. Shallow groundwater in the area is not used as a drinking water resource. The shallow groundwater is separated from the underlying Edwards Aquifer by low-permeability clays that are approximately 1,500 feet thick in the vicinity of the site. Thus the shallow groundwater is not in hydraulic communication with the Edwards Aquifer.

2.3 Site Inspections and Cleanup Activities



In August 2001, EPA began Superfund time-critical removal actions at the site. Removal actions on the northern portion of the site included the removal of asbestos containing materials from on-site containers, equipment, piping, and within buildings; removal of contaminated materials from within on-site containers, equipment, and piping; removal (demolition) of on-site containers, equipment, piping and other contaminated items and removal of contaminated soils. Removal actions on the southern portion of the site included the removal of contaminated materials from within on-site containers, equipment, and piping, including an underground storage tank; removal (demolition) of on-site containers, equipment, piping and other contaminated items; and removal of contaminated soils. In June 2001, the EPA proposed the site to the National Priorities List (NPL), but to date, the site has

not been listed. In March and April 2004, some of the Respondents voluntarily conducted a preliminary investigation at the site to gain a better understanding of the current site conditions. This investigation, the scope of which was not approved by EPA in advance, involved collection of soil and groundwater samples. The data collected from this investigation have not been validated by or formally approved by EPA.

A Remedial Investigation (RI) was conducted at the site by the Respondents from 2011 to 2013. The RI included evaluation of soil, groundwater, and soil gas both at the site and in the residential neighborhood southeast of Somerset Road. The results of the RI are currently being evaluated by EPA and a final report is being prepared. As noted in Section 2.2 above, petroleum hydrocarbons were found to be present in site soils and groundwater but were not detected in off-site groundwater at concentrations exceeding health-based screening levels.

SECTION 3.0 COMMUNITY BACKGROUND

3.1 Community Profile

San Antonio, occupying approximately 412.1 square miles, is the county seat of Bexar County, Texas. San Antonio is in South-Central Texas, approximately 140 miles northwest of the Gulf of Mexico.

According to a 2010 census, the population of San Antonio was 1,359,758. Of that number, 58.66 % are Hispanic. San Antonio is the seventh largest city in the United States. The median age in the San Antonio is 32.7 years. The 2009 median family income in San Antonio was \$42,513.

Within 0.5 miles of the site, 99% of the community is minority with a 20% Spanish language population.

3.2 History of Community Involvement

The EPA has worked with the surrounding community to insure that they are involved in the Superfund process. Numerous contacts have been made with local governmental officials, but to date, no replies have been received.

Fact sheets have been mailed to community members. Community interviews were done the week of September 16-19, 2013. (A map of the Service area can be found in Appendix L and the questionnaires can be found in Appendix M). A community meeting is scheduled for December 3, 2013

3.3 Key Community Concerns

Because of the site's proximity to Kelly Air Force Base, there was some misunderstanding regarding contamination at the site. In the communication efforts, Superfund staff and the Kelly Air Force Base staff tried to ensure that the community was aware of the differences between Kelly AFB and the R&H Oil/Tropicana Energy Site.

As a result of the community interviews, only 5.5% of the respondents indicated a slight concern. The majority of the community members interviewed had knowledge of the Site but did not think there was a concern. They are all on the City of San Antonio water system.

3.4 Responses to Community Concern

As part of developing this Community Involvement Plan, the EPA actively solicited community input to determine community concerns regarding the cleanup and to determine the most effective way of sharing information. The interviewees thought mail was the best way to share information. In an effort to gather information, the EPA conducted one-on-one interviews with community residents, partner agency staff, local officials, and community leaders. There was a lack of interest in participating.

Interviewees included representatives of the community adjacent to the Site, representatives from the South San Antonio Independent School District, and local church leaders.

3.5 Summary of Community Needs

Of the community members interviewed, 72.22% knew about the Site, while 27.78% had no knowledge of the Site. Only 5.55% of the respondents had a minimal concern of any contamination, while 94.45% of the respondents were not concerned about contamination. All those interviewed were on the City of San Antonio water system.

SECTION 4.0 EPA'S COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT PROGRAM

The overall goal of EPA's community involvement program is to promote two-way communication between citizens and EPA and to provide opportunities for meaningful and active involvement by the community during the cleanup process. The EPA will implement the community involvement activities described below. The following plan is based on the results of the community interviews described earlier; it addresses each issue that was identified as being important to the community.

4.1 The Plan

Issue 1: Keeping the public informed and up to date

Activity 1A: Designate a Community Involvement Coordinator (CIC)

Objective: To provide a primary liaison between the community and the EPA, and to ensure prompt, accurate, and consistent responses and information dissemination about the site. In those instances where EPA's CIC may be unable to provide adequate information (such as on technical issues), inquiries will be directed to the appropriate EPA contact.

Method: EPA will designate an EPA CIC to handle site inquiries and serve as a point of contact for community members. The CIC is appointed by the Region 6 Headquarters. Stephen Harper is the EPA CIC assigned to the site.

Timing: Stephen Harper was appointed CIC in July 2008.

Activity 1B: Prepare and distribute fact sheets and technical summaries

Objective: To provide citizens with current, accurate, easy-to-read, easy-to-understand information about the site.

Method: Fact sheets will be mailed to all parties on the site mailing list. In addition, copies will be available at the information repository and in various cooperating business locations in the community.

Timing: Fact Sheets will be prepared in English and Spanish and will be distributed as needed. As previously noted, fact sheets were distributed to the community in January and May 2011.

Activity 1C: Involve students, parents, and teachers through area schools

Objective: To educate faculty, students, and their parents about the site, to invite and address their concerns regarding it, and to caution students about the site.

Method: Address school faculty and students through visits and presentations to classroom, faculty, school assembly, or other meetings or events. Additionally, communicate with parents through take-home materials provided to the students and/or by attending and participating in PTA meetings or events.

Timing: As community concern warrants.

Activity 1D: Provide a toll-free "800 number" for the community to contact EPA

Objective: To enable citizens to get the latest information available when they want it, rather than having to wait for a meeting or a fact sheet, and without incurring any cost.

Method: EPA will activate the 800 number and publish it periodically in the local papers and in all fact sheets.

Timing: The line is currently operational – 1.800.533.3508.

Activity 1E: Maintain a mailing list for the site

Objective: To facilitate the distribution of site-specific information to everyone who needs or wants to be kept informed about the site.

Method: EPA created a mailing list that includes all residences adjacent to the

site, in known or suspected paths of migration, or those otherwise affected by the site. EPA solicited interested parties via fact sheets, newspaper articles, public meetings, public availabilities, etc.

Timing: EPA began working on the mailing list in 2001 and will review/revise it periodically to keep it current.

Activity 1F: Establish and maintain Information Repositories

Objective: To provide a convenient location where residents can go to read and copy official documents and other pertinent information about the site and EPA activities.

Method: The repository is a reference collection of site information containing the Administrative Record file, other site-specific information, the Community Involvement Plan, and the general Superfund process. The Community Involvement Coordinator will work with a local contact to establish the local repository. This repository will be accessible to the physically challenged, will have copier facilities, and will be available to residents during normal business hours and at least some evening and/or weekend hours. Additional repositories may also be established.

Timing: EPA established the local repository on June 14, 2001, located at the Pan American Library, 1122 W. Pyron, San Antonio, Texas, 78221. EPA adds new documents as they become available.

Activity 1G: Provide Site and Superfund information on the internet

Objective: To provide key resources for searching and listing both general and specific information about Superfund and hazardous waste issues.

Timing: Completed

Activity 1H: Establish and maintain the Administrative Record

Objective: To provide residents with a paper trail of all documents, resources, etc. used by the Regional Project Manager and Site Team in reaching remedy decisions about the site.

Method: EPA provides two sets of the Administrative Record for the site, one in

the EPA Region 6 offices located at 1445 Ross Avenue, Dallas, Texas, 75202, and one located in the local Information Repository near the site.

Timing: The Administrative Record is opened as soon as site investigation begins and remains open until the site activities are completed.

Issue 2: Provide adequate and meaningful opportunities for community involvement

Activity 2A: Hold public meetings

Objective: To update the community on site developments and address community questions, concerns, ideas and comments.

Method: Refer to Appendix H for suggested meeting locations. The EPA will schedule, prepare for, and attend all announced meetings. The EPA will provide at least two weeks' notice of the scheduled meeting. The Remedial Project Manager, Community Involvement Coordinator, and other appropriate EPA staff will attend.

Timing: A public meeting is required during the Proposed Plan comment period. The EPA will hold other meetings as appropriate.

Activity 2B: Make informal visits to community

Objective: To help keep community members informed about the site, while providing EPA with feedback about site activities and the community's opinions.

Method: The EPA will establish a presence in the community through informal, often unscheduled visits to talk spontaneously with local residents.

Timing: Throughout the entire Superfund process.

Activity 2C: Revise the Community Involvement Plan (CIP)

Objective: To identify and address community needs, issues, or concerns regarding the site or the cleanup remedy that are not currently addressed in the CIP.

Method: The revised CIP will update the information presented in the previous version of the CIP.

Timing: The EPA will revise the CIP as community concerns warrant or at least every three years until the site is closed out.

Activity 3A: Provide Technical Assistance for Communities (TASC)

Objective: An EPA headquarters contracting mechanism that provides a resource for independent, non-advocacy educational and technical assistance to a community affected by hazardous waste sites regulated by the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) and the Resource

Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA). This contract service is provided to communities so they can more effectively participate in the hazardous waste cleanup process in a more expedited manner.

Method: EPA will provide information about the Technical Assistance Services for Communities (TASC) program at public meetings and in site fact sheets as applicable. EPA will also provide briefing sessions to interested groups if so required. EPA will provide information about TASC contract information to qualified groups, and will provide assistance to the applicant group in completing the Statement of Work for the contract application.

Timing: As needed
